VI. Director's Report and Information Items

A. Washington update

John Morales reported:

Immigration Reform has taken priority; nothing related to WIA re-authorization.

B. State Update

John Morales reported:

- The Arizona Association of Workforce Developers (AAWD) met on May 29th in Phoenix.
- The major item on the agenda was Allocations for PY 2013; AAWD came to consensus on the formula allocations.
- Because of sequestration and the State utilizing the information from the American Community Survey 2010 (instead of 2000) when calculating their formulas, Yuma County will have a reduction of about 20% in funds on PY 2013. Providers' contracts (such as AWC and PPEP) will be reduced by 20%. We are taking steps to reduce our budgets: as of July 1st there will be no raises; we will start working 38 hours weeks; any positions that become vacant will not be replaced; etc.

C. Results of Workforce Arizona Council Meeting

- Sam Pepper attended the orientation and the first meeting of the Council on May 30th in Phoenix.
- The next meeting will be held on July 17th in Prescott.

E. Growing Our Own Destiny (GOOD) Program

Julie Engel reported:

• Julie Engel commended the students of the GOOD program for their

- accomplishments.
- San Luis Sonora was successful in attracting the company that manufactures highway safety poles, traffic signals, etc. Although the company will be located in San Luis Sonora, Yuma will reap many of the benefits as it will serve as the distribution point. A company that was supplying Johnson Controls will invest 3 million on the area for expansion as they will also be supplying the company in San Luis Sonora.
- Convey Health Insurance Services is offering a one-week training to the community to obtain the Health Insurance Agent License. The license can be used at any agency in town. Convey are also providing child care services. They will need 500 people by September in Yuma. The workforce needs to be bilingual; they anticipate making Yuma their south west hub.
- More layoffs are anticipated at Southgate Mall.
- The manufacturing application in partnership with University of Arizona and Pima did not get granted as it contained some mistakes and they were unable to make corrections.
- They will be applying for another grant on Strategic Planning for Manufacturing.




