4. Chair Update:



5. City of Phoenix WIOA Title I-B Negotiated Performance Levels for Program Years 2022 and 2023:

LaSetta Hogans, PBWDB Executive Director, provided a presentation regarding the Workforce Innovation and



Opportunity Act Title I-B negotiated performance Levels for program years 2022 and 2023 agreed-upon by the State and representatives of the City of Phoenix Workforce Development Board. Performance accountability, performance indicators, and The Department of Labor's (DOL) role in performance management was explained during the presentation. A demonstration of the WIOA negotiation process and the statistical model used to estimate performance levels was provided. A breakdown of the local workforce board performance cycle with the final City of Phoenix Title IB performance levels for program years 2022-2023 was provided during the presentation. A detailed explanation of the impact of not meeting performance and City of Phoenix staff accountability to the PBWD board was provided.

The percentage of program participants who attain a recognized postsecondary credential, or a secondary school diploma or its recognized equivalent, during participation in or within one year after exit from the program




The percentage of program participants are in an education or training program that leads to a recognized postsecondary credential or employment, and who are achieving measurable skill gains toward such a credential or employment

WIOA Negotiations Process – Local Workforce Boards



Title IB Performance Levels for Program Years 2022 - 2023




Performance Impacts

Combined local area/local workforce board performance impacts the state's performance outcomes


Staff at the Job Centers and providing Youth services are accountable to the Board for the contributions made to the local area performance
















6. Occupational Growth Rate:

PBWDB Chair, Latasha Causey, introduced City of Phoenix staff member, Sylvia Hokey, City of Phoenix Eligible Training Provider Coordinator in leading a presentation regarding the current occupational growth percentage rate assigned as an approval metric for training programs on the eligible training provider list. A definition of employment growth rate was provided with an explanation of why growth projections are important to the eligible training provider list was provided. The presentation included City of Phoenix industry and occupational projections pertaining to the focused industry sectors of construction, manufacturing, healthcare, advanced business services, and information technology was provided with research from the Arizona Commerce Authority website. The presentation provided an explanation of how raising the occupational growth percentage rate to 5% increases accountability for training



providers to provide quality training programs that lead to occupations that pay a sustainable living wage.

A motion to increase the City of Phoenix occupational growth percentage rate to 5% was made by PBWD Board Member, Jeff Clark, and seconded by PBWD Board Member, Steven Cramer.

Why are growth rate projections important?

Measures the growth of an industry and occupation in the workforce

Evaluates the effectiveness of a training program's learning outcomes

Increases the quality of training programs offered on the ETPL


