Junior Achievement of Arizona

Mission statement: Preparing Arizona kids to succeed in work and life.

Three Pillars of Junior Achievement: Career readiness, financial literacy, and entrepreneurship.

What we do

- Junior Achievement has a 70-year history with Arizona

- 53% of students own their own businesses

- Served over 170,00 K-12 students in 22-23

Arizona Career Pathways Presentation

Arizona Career Pathways is a nonprofit workforce training initiative of Valley Interfaith Project that partners with Maricopa Community Colleges to provide one-on-one wrap-around support services to hundreds of low-income students every year.

- Partner with Maricopa Community Colleges to provide one-on-one support and services to low-income students
- ARPA Funding
- Career Navigation Services
- Decade Long Partnership with the MCCCD
- Cost of basic needs is one of the critical components
- MCCCD / ACP Shared Public/Private Partnership
- High Demand Career Fields are a focus
- Average return on investment is 300%
